GROWING IN HOLINESS

- Our parish community has the opportunity to worship together on Sundays, Holy Days, and Thursdays. A Holy Hour is offered once a month and rosary is said before Mass during May and October. A Catholic or inspirational movie is offered several times a year.
- Since we are such a small parish, missions and other presentations are usually held in the neighboring parish of St. Teresa in Glennonville. Many of our older parishioners do not drive in the dark any more, but rides will be offered to those who need transportation.
- Parishioners need to be encouraged to grow in holiness by taking advantage of Cursillo and be active in the Diocesan/Deanery Council of Catholic Women. Potluck dinners could be followed by a religious activity.

FORMING INTENTIONAL DISCIPLES

The church provides the diocesan newspaper as a means of instruction. The parish community must set a good example by being enthusiastic and joyful about their own faith and willing to share the faith.

- Those who serve as lectors, extraordinary ministers, musician, etc. need to invite others to become active in these ministries. Sometimes an invitation is all it takes. However, some parishioners choose to be anonymous.
- No suggestions were given on how the Church could more effectively form intentional disciples.

BEING SENT TO WITNESS

- After consulting with Malden's Ministerial Alliance, St. Ann initiated and planned a Christmas
 Church Tour. Seven area churches participated. St. Ann hopes to continue the tradition of our
 priest speaking to Malden High School athletes upon the invitation of a Malden coach. Our
 priest has also led the prayer at a city council meeting.
- St. Ann helps those in need by donating items to Birthright, collecting nonperishable food items
 to be distributed by the Ministerial Alliance, and conducting a drive for hygiene items to help
 stock the Wellness Closet at the local high school.
- We can send encouraging notes to those who don't attend church anymore. We need to call
 and visit those who are homebound or in nursing homes, pray with them and take communion
 to them.
- To keep in touch with our college students and to remind them to keep the faith, St. Ann periodically sends packages including prayer cards, other items, and gift cards.
